# (European) Nightjar Caprimulgus europaeus (? circa 26, 1).

(Breeds Europe and Asia east to Lake Baikal and eastern Mongolia. Winters south of the Sahara).

From Thompson's time right through to the 1900s, the Nightjar was regarded as a common but somewhat local summer visitor and perhaps due to this its distribution is not well documented. Thompson gives details of its occurrences, some from around Belfast, where he regarded the species as "rarely seen". *Thompson* 1849.

Mrs. Gage in her history of Rathlin Island, County Antrim regarded the species as "rare". *Gage* 1851. Workman regarded the species as plentiful around Belfast and noted one on 4th July at Cavehill. *Workman* 1901.

Stewart gives further details of sites where they are to be found around Belfast. *Stewart* 1901. A 15th specimen in the Ulster Museum was taken at Glenarm, County Antrim on May 1917. *Foster* 1922 suggests that the species nested on the Antrim Hills, a few miles north of Hillsborough, County Down and on Slieve Croob, some five miles to the south.

Brown has given details of a bird seen near Glassdrummond, County Down, *Brown* 1901 while others reported its occurrence and breeding in the Mournes, County Down. *Anon.* 1902; *Anon.* in IN1903. J.P. Burkitt ascertained that the bird in question was a Nightjar and suggested that in 1954, it was suggested that it was a summer resident in small numbers in all counties, very local in distribution, with a stronghold in County Fermanagh.

It was recorded every summer on Rathlin Island, County Antrim though breeding was never proved. The Mourne mountains, County Down were another favoured locality. *Deane* 1954. *Kennedy, Ruttledge & Scroope* 1954 have the following to say on its status in Northern Ireland; "Fermanagh appears to be most frequented of the northern counties, but the bird is rare in Down and, according to Rankin, very infrequently met with in the Mourne area. Rankin does not list it for Antrim, but Benington says its breeds in bogland near Ballymoney [Garrybog], but this is not generally known. The late S. McAdam stated that it was well distributed in the Ballymena district, where, however, breeding has not been proved."
